



BEFORE YOU START:

Before you begin thinking through multiplying your ministry, decide which paradigm you'll be working toward. Check the box which applies.

- Scale - You plan to grow your ministry, nearly exactly the same as it is now, just in a new place.
- Multiply - You plan to plant another ministry in a new place, but it might look quite different than your current ministry.
- Send - You plan to release one of your leaders out to start a new ministry.*

PRAYER PLAN

We plant our churches in the physical and work in the world, but we also wrestle "against rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places." (Ephesians 6:12) If we want to see victory and fruit in our ministries, we must be praying without ceasing. (1 Thess. 5:17) What is your plan to pray through this coming season?

OPERATING MODEL

As you begin the process of discerning how to best multiply your microchurch, take a moment to think and pray through your current ministry model. This setp will help you with the rest of this worksheet.

COMPARE YOUR CONTEXTS

Begin by contrasting the context of your current ministry and the new ministry you're going to plant. The 'context' of a ministry is the factors that inform what the ministry should look like. For this exercise, we'll evaluate the variables of leadership, location and people.

LEADERSHIP

Start by thinking through what the leadership looks like in your current ministry and what it will look like in the new ministry.

PEOPLE

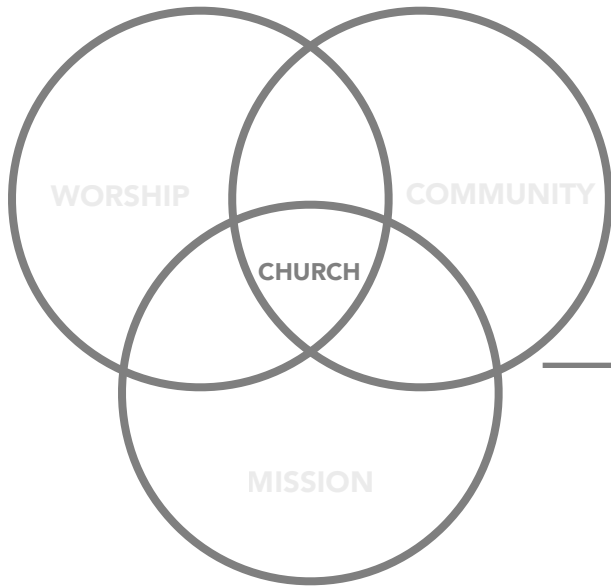
Now, review the people who are involved in your current ministry (these would be the people who your leadership is serving). Compare the two below.

IMITATE

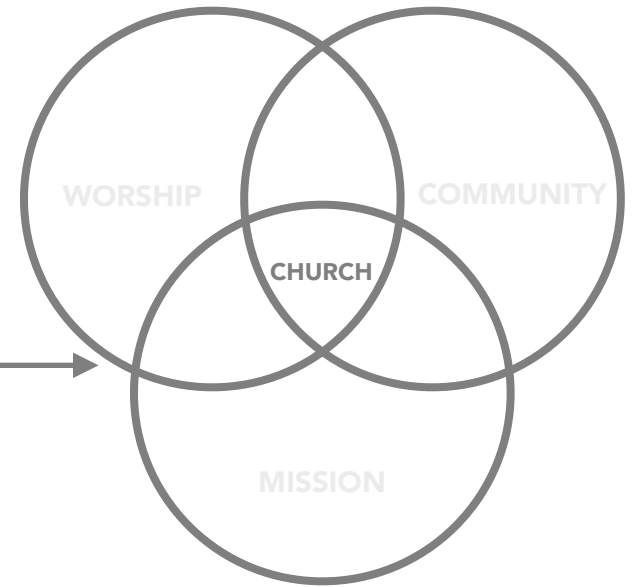
If the contexts between the current and new ministries are similar, it might be useful to start by doing the same thing the current ministry does.

INNOVATE

If the contexts between the current and new ministries are dissimilar, it might be best to think through a way to evolve the current expression.

INITIATE

If the context is completely different, it might be helpful to go back to the drawing board and strategize from the beginning.



We believe that church happens when believers gather together in expression of worship, community and mission. Take a moment to describe what each of these look like in your context in the space below.

Now, think through what these three elements need to look like in the new setting. Use Step 1 to help you discern how these will be expressed. Use 1 of the 3 transitions above to help guide your decisions for worship, community and mission.

Finally, write out what each element of your new ministry might look like, after thinking and praying through the Imitate, Innovate, Initiate process. Write your thoughts in the space below.

NETWORK RELATIONSHIP
